PIKANGIKUM CELEBRATES FIRST-EVER FIRST RESPONDERS CLASS

INTEGRATED EMERGENCY SERVICES

In November, Pikangikum and the IFNA Integrated Emergency Services (IES) team celebrated the success of nine individuals who graduated as part of the first-ever class of First Responders in the community. The trainees successfully completed five eight-hour days of rigorous training exercises designed to provide hands-on learning experiences to gain the knowledge, skills and tools required to provide life-saving treatment to those with illnesses or injuries in the community. The trainees also learned new skills including basic life support and CPR.

PREVENTING ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH RISKS


TECHNICAL SERVICES
