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FEDERAL BUDGET NEARS APPROVAL FOR CRUCIAL PIKANGIKUM INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECT





TECHNICAL SERVICES

In April, the government unveiled their federal budget including pivotal funding for the Berens River Bridge and Road Project, a significant development for Pikangikum First Nation and six neighbouring communities.

This allocation signifies a major step toward final approval of the funding. The total estimated cost is \$76.4 million, and while the exact value of the government funding commitment is yet to be confirmed, all necessary designs, studies, and permits are in place, making the project 'shovel ready'. The project will commence as soon as funding is secured.

The Berens River Bridge and Road Project involves construction of a 194m engineered timber bridge across the Berens River and a 15km all-season road to Pikangikum. Currently, Pikangikum and the six northern communities—Deer Lake, Keewaywin, McDowell Lake, North Spirit Lake, Poplar Hill, and Sandy Lake First Nations—experience extremely limited road access, relying on a brief winter road season that spans only 2-6 weeks.

The project will benefit over 10,000 residents in these remote communities with improved access to essential services, employment opportunities, and increased safety. The bridge and road will enable more reliable transportation, facilitating better access to medical, social, and educational services, while also lowering the costs of goods and services.

As the final approval process unfolds, Pikangikum and its partners eagerly anticipate breaking ground on this transformative project.

NEW VANS ENHANCE HEALTHCARE TRANSPORTATION AND ACCESSIBILITY FOR IFNA COMMUNITIES

HEALTH SERVICES



IFNA has made a significant advancement in transportation and healthcare access as requested by member communities. The Jordan's Principle Transportation Van Initiative, which began in December 2022, received approval in July 2023, and now in 2024 the vehicle deliveries have begun.

Additionally, IFNA has introduced two mobile medical clinic vans, stationed in Sioux Lookout and Thunder Bay. These medical vans will travel to member communities and/or community members, bringing essential healthcare services directly to those in need. The mobile clinics are set up as 'doctor's offices on wheels,' complete with exam beds to ensure a clean, comfortable environment for patients and healthcare providers

EMPOWERING FOOD SECURITY: NIDAWEKICHIGEHWIN INITIATIVE TAKES ROOT

STRATEGIC INITIATIVES



IFNA has embarked on a journey to address food security issues within member communities. The Nidawekichigehwin Initiative is a strategy combining infrastructure, education, health information, and economic development with the goal to create a multi-generational impact.

In April 2024, a project milestone was achieved with the IFNA Chiefs Council signing a Resolution approving the Nidawekichigehwin Initiative. Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug (KI) leads the way with a feasibility study set for completion in June 2024. Following KI, Whitesand and Lac Seul are also preparing to launch their projects.

The initial phase targets growing enough food to feed 30% of each community's population, with a long-term vision of increasing output to cover 100%. This approach aims to improve food access and quality, while also promoting economic growth by creating jobs and new revenue opportunities.

INCREASING LIFE-SAVING CAPACITY IN PIKANGIKUM

INTEGRATED EMERGENCY SERVICES





Life-saving training has been delivered to students at Eenchokay Birchstick School (EBS) in Pikangikum, bringing the important lifesaving skills of CPR and AED to community members. An Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is a device that can restart a heart during cardiac arrest, and its immediate use in an emergency can significantly increase survival rates by restoring a normal heart rhythm until emergency personnel arrive. By learning how to operate and apply this device, students can become lifesavers in critical moments. IFNA's Integrated Emergency Services (IES) team plans to expand this crucial training, to all our member communities.

Furthermore, IES's Advanced Care Paramedic Gurkan Ozel will be in community on a full-time basis. He is engaging stakeholders as part of planning for the Pikangikum Pediatric Medical Assistance Team funded by Jordan's Principle. PMAT is focused on the school-age children incommunity and their health needs.

In a significant development, IFNA's application to the Ministry of Health (MOH) for a 911 paramedic ambulance service has been successful. The approval marks a groundbreaking achievement, with planning, paramedic recruitment, equipment purchases, and the creation of an administrative building structure already underway.

The service is tentatively set to go live in the fall of 2024. Beyond filling a critical gap in life saving support for Pikangikum, the initiative is expected to bring substantial downstream benefits, including the potential to scale and expand into four other IFNA communities.

NURSING STATION SECURITY GAIN IMPORTANT SKILLS

Nursing Station Security
Guards and other staff in
Kitchenuhmaykoosib
Inninuwug recently
completed a comprehensive
Standard First Aid course,
which included CPR, AED,
and Naloxone training. The
training, essential for
ensuring the guards are
well-equipped to serve the
communities, is part of an
ongoing initiative to
enhance the skills of Nursing
Station Security Guards.

Since 2021, this training has been facilitated by 2J2, an Indigenous-owned and operated organization based in Saskatoon. Their collaboration has extended to various training in both Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug and Pikangikum, as part of IFNA's commitment to community safety and preparedness.

FOREST FIRE SEASON OUTLOOK

A significant change in the weather has greatly diminished the forest fire threat, reducing danger for IFNA member communities. Following one of the wettest Mays on record, the current conditions have mitigated what was expected to be a challenging forest fire season.

Despite this more positive outlook, it is important to stay ready! Ensure that you are aware of potential risks and prepared for potential challenges that may arise.
